MAN WHO LOST SIGHT IN CIVIL WAR FIGHT DIES

James W. Seegar, 98, Morgan County Man Who Distinguished Himself in Civil War, Dies in Decatur.

Fred Seegar of 208 East Cham-bers street was notified Sunday night of the death of his father, James Wesley Seegar, 98 year old Civil War veteran in Decatur. Blinded during the Civil War, Mr. Seegar had been sightless since he was 29 years old. He was a former Jacksonville resident and his career both in army service and civilian life was remarkable. A few years ago on his 95th anniversary the Decatur Herald carried an extensive sketch of his life, featuring the fact that he had just entered the poultry business at an age when most persons are living a retired life. Mr. Seegar was born May 10, 1835, in Bellfontaine, O. When three years old he came with his family to Illinois. The family settled in Union county near Jonesboro.

When 17 years old Mr. Seegar moved to Jacksonville where he learned the iron molder's trade. While in his twenties he organized a group of young men friends and with them formed a company of national guards of which he was captain. This was an artillery company. When the Civil war occurred the company volunteered as a body, but owing to a lack of artillery equipment the company was mustered in as Company I, 101st Illinois infantry. Thirteen of the outstanding engagements of the war were participated in by Company I. Three times its leader, Mr. Seegar, was wounded, each time in the head. It was in an engagement by Trickham Post office, near Risacka, (Reseca)Ga., on May 15, 1864, that Mr. Seegar received his last and most serious wound. His company had been fighting for about three hours. The engagement seemed to be almost over when a bullet from a Confederate soldier's gun struck Mr. Seegar in the left eye, shattering the bridge of his nose and severing the optic nerve. The company surgeon performed an operation on the field which saved the right eyeball, but could not preserve the sight. The wounded soldier was sent to his home in Jacksonville and later to the soldiers hospital in Quincy where he remained until October, 1864. The inactivity of the hospital did not appeal to him, so he returned to Jacksonville and lived here until about thirty-three years ago.

In 1860 the decedent was united in marriage with Elizabeth Souders who preceded him in death a number of years ago. Ten children have also preceded him in death. He leaves one son, Fred Seegar of this city, and one sister, Mrs. Rachel Wyckoff of Wilkes-Barre, Pa.; seven grandchildren, six great-grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

(Note: Mr. Seegar died 14 May 1933 and was buried in Diamond Grove Cemetery at Jacksonville, Illinois.)
